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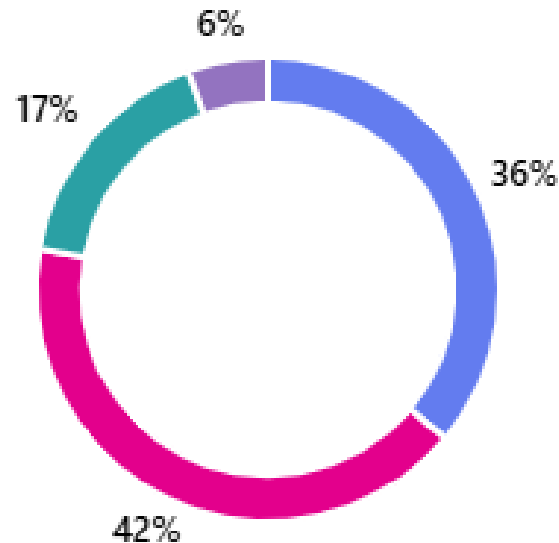

- **Memorandum of Understanding informed by the University's Code of Student Conduct**

 - 1. Disrupting, or interfering with any academic, administrative, or other University activities; (13.1, p.4)*
 - 2. Obstructing, or interfering with, the functions, duties or activities of any Person; (13.2, p.4)*
 - 3. Violent, indecent, disorderly, threatening or offensive behaviour or language towards any Person (whether expressed orally, in writing or electronically (including via social media)), including sexual violence or abuse of any Person; (13.3, p.4)*
 - 4. Harassment of any Person whilst engaged in any University work, study or activity, including bullying and sexual harassment; (13.4, p.4)*
 - 5. Conduct which unjustifiably infringes freedom of thought or expression whilst on University premises or engaged in University work, study or activity; (13.5, p.4)”*
